Since returning to Australia, Melissa has contributed on poverty issues with Sydney City Mission, on indigenous issues with Reconciliation Australia and on refugee and asylum-seeker issues on the Committee of the Victorian Foundation for Survivors of Torture.

Melissa comes to the Institute from the International Conflict Resolution Centre and Faculty of Law at the University of Melbourne. She is a member of the United Nations Expert Working Group on Online Dispute Resolution and coconvened a Fulbright Symposium on Peace and Human Rights Education in 2005. She will be dividing her time between Melbourne and Canberra in her new role.
