Through its network of offices around the country, the AIIA hosts a vibrant, topical and broad-ranging program of speakers, accessible to members and non-members alike. With around 150 such events each year, these feature an eminent and expert array of opinion leaders and decision-makers drawn from national and international politics, diplomacy, academia, media and business.

In 2012-13, our speakers engaged AIIA audiences on topics as diverse as Iran and the West, international volunteering, US President Obama's election prospects, Rio+20 and the sustainable development agenda, the Arab Spring and its aftermath, rhetoric and reality in Australian foreign policy, Europe's economic malaise and its wider impacts, China's leadership transition, political change in Myanmar, regional security tensions in North Asia, Australia in the Asian Century and the rise of global social media.

The AIIA also partnered with academic, business and government counterparts on a number of special events.

Dialogue

The AIIA works with a wide range of partners to facilitate dialogue and strengthen understanding of international issues; from roundtables with high level visitors, specialist workshops and second track dialogue to people-to-people contact with other countries.

Indonesia-Australia Dialogue

The second Indonesia-Australia Dialogue, a Prime Ministerial and Presidential initiative to enhance people-to-people links between our two countries, was held in Sydney from 3-4 March 2013. It was co-convened by John McCarthy, AllA National President and former Ambassador to Indonesia, and Dr Rizal Sukma, Executive Director of the Centre for Strategic and International Studies (Jakarta).

The AIIA was again selected by the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade to act as secretariat following its performance at the inaugural Dialogue. Discussions covered domestic, regional and global issues and explored opportunities for closer engagement in business, culture, education, science and technology. The Dialogue helped build relationships between leaders in a range of fields and foster high-level commitment to advancing areas of the bilateral relationship at all levels of society.

Roundtable with UK Shadow Foreign Secretary Rt Hon Mr Douglas Alexander

The AIIA hosted a roundtable discussion with some of Australia's foremost international relations experts for the UK Shadow Foreign Secretary Mr Douglas Alexander during his visit to Australia in June 2013 as a guest of the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT) under the Special Visits Program.

Forum on Former Ministers for Foreign Affairs 1960-72

The AIIA hosted a Forum at Government House in February 2013 to discuss the life, work and achievements of Australian Ministers for Foreign Affairs 1960-72. The Forum brought together Australia's most eminent experts in international relations, former senior diplomats and government officials.



Defence Workshop

In May 2013 the AIIA convened a workshop in conjunction with the Department of Defence to examine perceptions of strategic risk. The workshop brought together a group of think tanks, academic and other experts to discuss Australia's potential strategic risks and opportunities out to 2035.

Consular Roundtable

In June 2013, the AIIA, in conjunction with DFAT, convened a roundtable of senior DFAT representatives, key stakeholders and the Minister of Foreign Affairs to explore the rising demand in Australian consular services and possible solutions to the growing mismatch between expectation and reality.

Dialogue

The AIIA partners with a range of state and federal government, academic, business and not-for-profit entities. The AIIA is networked with 116 sister institutes worldwide.

Australian Journal of International Affairs: Editor's Report

In 2012-2013, the Australian Journal of International Affairs (AJIA) continued to expand its reach and impact among readers. Full text downloads of the Journal's content hit an all-time high in 2012 and reflected a broadening readership of the AJIA outside Australia.



The AJIA maintains its enviable position as the most highly-ranked and cited Australian peer-reviewed outlet concerned with international relations. In the authoritative Thomson Reuters Journal Citation Report for 2013, the AJIA improved its annual Impact Factor with an increase to 0.538. More significantly, in terms of sustained performance, the journal's 5 Year Impact Factor grew from 0.455 to 0.551.

The AllA launched the Boyer Prize in 2012 to recognise the best article published each year in the Australian Journal of International Affairs. Adam Lockyer of the University

of Sydney took out the inaugural Boyer Prize for his paper *Evaluating civil development in counterinsurgency operations: the case for a field experiment in Afghanistan*. This paper was judged the most original and innovative contribution to the Journal, and likely to have lasting impact.

After four years, I stepped down from my role as the Journal's editor-in-chief in July 2013. Professor Nick Bisley was appointed editor-in-chief following a competitive selection process. I acknowledge with thanks the dedication of Managing Editor Tracey Arklay and the support of the <u>Editorial Board</u>.

Research Committee: Chair's Report

2012-13 was a particularly busy period of research activities.

The AllA publication support grant was offered for the first time. The committee received a number of expressions of interest from scholars of Australian foreign affairs. The recipients were Dr Daniel Baldino, Dr Andrew Carr and Dr Anthony Langlois, for assistance in the publication and promotion of their work Australian Foreign Policy: Debates and Controversies, to be published by Oxford University Press. The book



examines Australian foreign policy through the lens of topical contemporary debates around issues such as sovereignty, security, diplomacy, statecraft and decision-making. The author contribution list includes 30 high-profile university and other experts.




The AIIA has published the *Australia in World Affairs* series since 1950. Professors James Cotton and John Ravenhill have edited these volumes for the past twenty years, helping the publication achieve considerable prominence. In December 2011, after publication of *Middle Power Dreaming*, *Australia in World Affairs 2006-2010*, James Cotton and John Ravenhill decided to retire from this role. Professor Mark Beeson and

Dr Shahar Hameiri, both from Murdoch University, were appointed new co-editors. The next volume will cover the 2011-2015 period

and be published in 2016.

The AIIA is undertaking a series of forums on former Australian ministers of foreign affairs. R.G. Casey: Minister for External Affairs 1951-60, the product of a forum held at Government House, was released and made available for download at www.aiia.asn.au/resources/publications.



The AIIA has continued its successful series of policy commentaries aimed at contributing informed perspectives on topical issues of relevance to Australian foreign policy. The series is intended for AIIA members as well as the general public and media. The volumes are produced both in hard and soft copy and are available from www.aiia.asn.au. Two commentaries were released during the 2012-2013 year:



- 'Australia and the Security Council' included contributions by Professor Ramesh Thakur, Dr Christopher Michaelsen, Thom Woodroofe and Guillermo Purente Ordorico.
- 'Free Trade Negotiations in the Asia-Pacific' looked at the implications of the Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP) and Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership (RCEP) for Australia, with contributions by Bryan Mercurio, Stephen Grenville, Peter Drysdale and Jayant Menon.

Ensuring our continuing commitment to the *Emerging Scholars* series, the Research Committee was pleased to appoint Mhairi Cowden, Eva Entenmann and Alix Kearney as the new editors of this publication.

Fostering understanding of the country behind the headlines



Myanmar Study Tour: AllA VIC conducted a tour of Myanmar from 20 April to 4 May 2012, visiting Yangon, Naypyidaw, Inn Thein, Bagan, Mandalay, Inle Lake and Tanuggyi. The tour was led by Mr Chris Lamb and Ms Robyn Byrne OAM. Chris has had a long association with Myanmar, having served in the Australian Embassy in Yangon (Rangoon) from 1972–74 and again as Ambassador from 1986–1989. Tour members met with Myanmar Government Ministers and politicians including Aung San Suu Kyi, the Mayor of Yangon, Mandalay University professors and many civil society representatives.

New Zealand Study Tour: AllA NSW took a group across to New Zealand for a short tour, which included meetings with New Zealand political figures and with our cross-Tasman counterpart, the New Zealand

Institute of International Affairs. The group gained first-hand appreciation of the extensive damage caused by the earthquake in Christchurch and of the issues involved in the rebuilding of that city.

Indonesia Study Tour: A 15-strong group led by AIIA NSW President Colin Chapman undertook a two-week high level study tour of Indonesia, including four days of meetings in Jakarta with Indonesian ministers and officials, think tanks, journalists, Australian Ambassador Greg Moriarty and others.




Youth engagement is a key part of AllA's mission statement. Youth outreach includes schools programs, careers fairs, internships and bursaries. AllA youth networks help inform and foster debate amongst a new generation of leaders. We also host <u>more than 100 interns annually</u> from around Australia and across the globe.

Young Diplomats Program

From 9-11 October 2012 the AIIA hosted the winners of the 2012 Young Diplomats Program (YDP). The YDP is an educational program run by James Cook University in conjunction with the AIIA. Teams of Year 10 students test their research and diplomatic skills in a mock negotiation, with the winners awarded a trip to Canberra and a visit to the Embassy of Japan. Quarterly Access



There are currently few avenues for non-established writers in Australia to voice their insights on global events. *Quarterly Access* is the national publication of the youth networks of the Australian Institute of International Affairs. It is an entirely volunteer based publication, providing opportunity for students and young professionals to publish in-depth high-quality articles on global issues of importance. *Quarterly Access*' editorial team is located in Melbourne. *Quarterly Access* is published in browser-friendly HTML format, PDF and print; it is also distributed to AlIA branches and university libraries across the country.

Young Professionals Networks

Several AIIA state and territory offices run dedicated programs for young professionals, including Queensland, Victoria and Western Australia.

AllA Victoria Young Professionals Forum (YPF): In early 2012 much of the leadership of the ACCESS group stepped down, reflecting changes in study and employment responsibilities. A working group was established to develop a program of activities of

interest to our under-35 members and a committee established to oversee its activities. The first event organised by the YPF was undertaken in conjunction with the Australia-China Young Professionals Initiative.

AllA WA Young Professionals Network (YPN): The AllA WA YPN continued to grow during the 2012-13 year. The annual 'Careers Without Borders' event was one of several run by AllA WA to introduce young people to international work, internship and study opportunities. The YPN, in coordination with the WA chapter of the Australia-China Young Professionals Initiative, hosted Australia's Ambassador to China, Frances Adamson, for a discussion on the Australia-China relationship. The 'Developing International Scholars Workshop' was again held this year to promote up-and-coming young international relations scholars.

Awards and Prizes

The AIIA runs a number of international relations-focused competitions as part of its youth outreach. These include fun quiz nights and prestigious national awards.

Nygh Internship

The Peter Nygh Hague Conference Internship supports a postgraduate student or graduate of an Australian law school to undertake an internship with The Hague Conference on Private International Law. The internship, offered by the AIIA in partnership with the International Law Association (Australian Branch), provides funds to cover the cost of travel to the Netherlands together with a contribution towards living expenses. The AIIA congratulates this year's winner, Brooke Marshall.



ACT Student Essay Competition

In 2012 the ACT Branch launched a Student Essay Competition to promote interest in international affairs. The 2012 winners were Elise Thomas and Stuart Watters. The AIIA thanks ACT Council member June Verrier for her work on this project.

WA Bursary for Studies in Asia

AllA WA offers a bursary aimed at encouraging young Australians studying at Western Australian universities to deepen their understanding of our region through in-country study and work experience. The AllA congratulates this year's winners, Janelle May and Hayley Davis, both of whom will take advantage of the bursary to work and study in Indonesia.

National Treasurer's Report

Overview

The last financial year has been a challenging one as cash reserves have been reduced by unexpected and long term vacancies at the AIIA's headquarters building at Stephen House.

The AIIA is in a difficult financial situation in that a considerable proportion of its income is neither guaranteed nor entirely predictable. The AIIA relies on the generosity of donations, bequests and government grants.

Specifically the Institute's income is, and continues to be, derived from four main sources (in order of magnitude):

- Grants income, including from the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade
- Royalties from publications such as the Australian Journal of International Affairs
- Donations, bequests and sponsorship
- Rental revenue from Stephen House

The situation has been helped by astute and careful management of resources by the AllA's energetic National Executive Director, Melissa Conley Tyler and her deputy John Robbins under the guidance of National President John McCarthy.

Donations

Once again, National Vice-President Zara Kimpton has been an outstanding role model for current and future donors, bringing forward a donation of \$40,000 in addition to \$10,000 previously donated this year. Thank you, Zara.

National Treasurer's Report

All donations are tax deductible as the AIIA has DGR status, which means the AIIA is a registered charity for fundraising purposes and has income tax emption. On-line tax-deductible donations can be made via the AIIA website (www.aiia.asn.au). Donated funds are distributed to the state branches in accordance with the National Executive's decisions, whilst taking into account the donor's wishes. Apart from distribution of donations, branches are supported primarily by membership and events income.

State branches continue to ensure that the Australia-wide membership is well-served through remaining focused on the primary aim of the AIIA: promoting an interest in, and a knowledge of, international relations.

Ongoing expenditure

The organisation's ongoing expenditure is mainly associated with the previously mentioned income streams, such as maintaining Stephen House, the AllA's publishing activities and grant activities. Salary expenditure is very low for such a high profile organisation with the National Executive Director and Deputy Director being the only paid staff.

Additional support

This year the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade has provided valuable additional assistance by seconding a senior officer, Peter Macfarlane, to fill the role of AIIA Director of Communications. We are also fortunate to benefit from the broad ranging voluntary assistance of interns from both overseas and Australia.

National Treasurer's Report

Nygh Fund

The AIIA also manages the Nygh Fund which sponsors an internship with the Hague Conference for Private International Law. Large gifts from the Nygh family and the Attorney General's Department generate the income for this scholarship. This year the AIIA was delighted to present the award to Brooke Marshall on behalf of the Fund. Our congratulations go to Brooke.

Outlook

Strenuous efforts to fill most of the vacant office space have contributed to a better outlook for 2013-14, but this coming year some very tough decisions will need to be made by the AIIA National Executive to ensure the long-term future of the organisation.
