Outcomes Report

A seminar discussing the Smart Power capability requirements of Australia as a middle power was held at the AlIA Conference Centre in Deakin, Canberra on 15 February 2012.

The seminar, hosted by the Australian Institute of International Affairs and chaired by ACT Branch President Ian Dudgeon, was a closed event held under the Chatham House rule. The seminar brought together a variety of government officials, members of the Australian Defence Forces and Australian Federal Police, academics, industry professionals and the media to discuss, debate and engage with the concepts of hard, soft and smart power. The object of the seminar was to identify Australia's Smart Power capability requirements across the war/peace spectrum as well as means for measuring their effectiveness. Findings and recommendations of the seminar will be presented in a report to government.

Highlights of the seminar included:

- Insightful pre-recorded message from Professor Joseph Nye on the concept of smart power
- More than forty participants, including: Dennis Richardson, Secretary of DFAT; Philip Flood, former Secretary of DFAT; Ric Smith, former Secretary of Defence; Lt General (R) John Sanderson, former Governor of Western Australia; Innes Willox, Chief Executive of the Australian Industry Group; Charlie McElhone, General Manager of the National Farmer's Federation.
- Coverage of a range of issues including how Australian diplomacy, aid, defence and trade can be used effectively as smart power tools
- Case study of RAMSI which provided insights from personnel on the ground and presented an example of how smart power has worked in the past and lessons to improve in the future
- The overall program received a 4.25 out of a possible 5.0 rating from participants

Objectives

The object of the seminar was to bring influential figures together to examine Smart Power in an Australian context and to discover its utility in increasing the power projection of Australia as a middle power.

The concept of Smart Power emerged approximately twenty years ago and became increasingly popular following Joseph Nye's publications on the topic in 2004 and 2011. It is most commonly defined as "the toolbox of all the instruments available for the pursuit of foreign policy". It utilises both hard coercive power, such as the military, and soft persuasive power, such as diplomacy. Smart Power is the effective use of these instruments in order to maximise the power projection of a country.

In the Asian Century it is increasingly important for Australia, as a middle power in the Asian neighbourhood, to maximise its power projection. Considering this, the seminar focused on what capabilities Australia needs to employ Smart Power effectively, where it has been failing and how it can improve for the future.

The seminar brought together experts from various spheres of influence to formulate recommendations on how actors can best utilise their capabilities to project power and, importantly, how different actors can work together to maximise the influence of Australia worldwide.

Specific objectives included:

- To discuss the strengths, weaknesses and areas for improvement of Australia's smart power tools
 including military, diplomacy, aid and business.
- To identify means of measuring the effectiveness of smart power tools.
- To report to government on the principal issues discussed, including Australia's identified Smart
 Power capability requirements and their potential use in support of national objectives.
