

National President's Forum Australia and the Chinese Century?

Outcomes Report

This report summarises the main outcomes of the National President's Forum hosted by the Australian Institute of International Affairs held in Brisbane on 19 October 2010.

The Forum brought together government officials, academics, journalists, professionals and other experts to discuss, debate, and engage with the many contemporary issues which shape Australia-China relations today. The Forum was preceded by a public forum moderated by the *Australian Financial Review* China correspondent Colleen Ryan.

Highlights of the Forum included:

- Participation by over 30 experts on Australia-China relations
- Involvement of four key government departments, seven universities, five international organisations and media representatives
- Lively opening addresses followed by an emphasis on open discussion
- Preparation of a Rapporteur's Report by Geoffrey Miller AO
- Distribution of reports and recommendations to relevant policy-makers

Objectives

The National President's Forum is one of the AIIA's most prestigious events, bringing together a select group of scholars, government officials and local experts for invitation-only discussion under the Chatham House Rule.

Specific objectives included:

- To bring together a select group of Australian, Chinese and other international experts to discuss the current state and future of the Australia-China relationship
- To analyse Australia's current engagement and strategic interests regarding China
- To examine the key issues which have a significant bearing on Australia China relations and that are essential to understanding China
- To debate and share ideas, and formulate recommendations for the future direction of Australia's engagement with China
- To assist public education about Australia's engagement with China as well as China's possible role as regional and/or global leader
- To establish a platform for future collaboration between Australia and China
- To produce solid policy recommendations for Australia's future policy on China.

Prior to the Forum at Parliament House, the AIIA organised a Public Forum at the Gardens Theatre, Queensland University of Technology. The *Australian Financial Review* China correspondent Colleen Ryan moderated a distinguished and engaging panel session exploring Australia-China relations. This free public event aimed to take discussions to a wider audience and has been attended by more than people.

Following the National's President Forum, all the participants were invited by Her Excellency the Governor of Queensland Ms Penelope Wensley AO to a reception at Government House for the presentation of the 2010 Fernberg Lecture by the Honourable Stephen Robertson MP, Minister for Trade and Minister for Natural Resources, Mines and Energy and a reception afterwards.

The incoming AIIA National President John McCarthy AO also spoke at the Export Week Breakfast organised by the Queensland Government Trade and Investment Commission at the Hilton Hotel on 20 October 2010.
