Outcomes Report

The third Indonesia-Australia Dialogue was held in Yogyakarta from 28-30 August 2016.

The Indonesia-Australia Dialogue initiative was jointly announced by leaders during the March 2010 visit to Australia by Indonesian President Yudhoyono as a bilateral second track dialogue to enhance people-to-people links between the two countries. The third Indonesia-Australia Dialogue was co-convened by Mr John McCarthy, Past AIIA National President and former Ambassador to Indonesia, and His Excellency Hamzah Thayeb, Indonesian Ambassador to Australia from 2005 to 2009. The AIIA was again selected by the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade to act as secretariat following its performance in the previous Dialogues.

Highlights of the Dialogue included:

- Participation by an impressive Australian delegation including politicians, senior academic and media experts as well as leaders in business, science and civil society.
- Two days of Dialogue held in an atmosphere of open exchange with sharing of expertise and insights at a high level among leading Indonesian and Australian figures.
- Keynote address delivered by Indonesian's Minister for Foreign Her Excellency Retno L.P. Marsudi.
- Opening statements delivered by Dialogue Co-Chairs John McCarthy AO FAIIA and His Excellency Hamzah Thayeb.
- Welcome dinner for delegates hosted by Sri Sultan Hamengkubuwono B X at the Sultan's Palace, including an address by His Excellency Abdurranhman Mohammad Fachir, Indonesian Vice Foreign Minister.
- Luncheon hosted by Director General for Asia Pacific and African Affairs, Ambassador Dera Percaya, including address by His Excellency Paul Grigson, Australian Ambassador to Indonesia
- Substantial coverage by Indonesian, Australian and international media.

Objectives

The objective of the Indonesia-Australia Dialogue was to facilitate people-to-people links through discussion on a broad range of topics. Discussions covered domestic, regional and global issues and explored opportunities for closer engagement in business, culture, education, science and technology.

Drawing on the experience of other leadership dialogues, the Indonesia-Australia Dialogue sought to build relationships between leaders in a range of fields and develop high-level commitment to advancing areas of the relationship at all levels of society. The Dialogue was conducted in roundtable format under Chatham House rule to enable a frank exchange of views.

Specific objectives of the Dialogue included:

- To create a platform for frank discussion on Indonesia and Australia's bilateral relationship.
- To establish a forum for discussion of Indonesian and Australian cooperation in regional and global affairs.
- To enhance people-to-people links through the free exchange of ideas on a range of topics facing Indonesia and Australia.
- To provide an informal dialogue between the two nations that incorporated government officials and leading individuals from both countries.
- To involve a range of participants, including industry, media, academia and community organisations and youth representatives.
- To discuss potential areas for collaboration between Indonesia and Australia in business, culture, education, science and technology.
- To produce a final report, and provide this to participants, government and general public.

Format

The Dialogue was divided in to five sessions, each co-chaired by an Indonesian and Australian delegate responsible for facilitating discussion among all Dialogue participants. To stimulate debate, each session began with a five minute "trigger speech" by an Australian and Indonesian delegate. The topics covered were:

Keynote Address by Indonesian Minister of Foreign Affairs

Minister for Foreign Affairs H.E. Retno Marsudi delivered a keynote speech which highlighted that Indonesia and Australia are neighbors by destiny. She commended that the dialogue has been able to create interactive and fruitful dialogue among participants on a wide range of areas in the spirit of mutual trust and friendship. Having graduated from the University of Gadjah Mada in Yogyakarta and having been assigned to the Indonesian Embassy in Canberra, Australia, she welcomed the convening of this third Indonesia-Australia Dialogue in Yogyakarta as both Yogyakarta and Australia have special meaning to Minister Marsudi.

Indonesia-Australia relations have been through thick and thin; nevertheless, it continues to be one of the most important relationships which is clearly reflected by the signing of the Comprehensive Partnership in 2005 and the Lombok Treaty in 2006. Minister Marsudi specifically referred to the Javanese proverb "Rukun Agawe Santosa, Crah Agawe Bubrah" which means: "If we maintain cordial relations, it will bring prosperity if we damage relations, it will create adversity". The message of this proverb could well be set within the context of Indonesia-Australia bilateral relations.

Minister Marsudi further highlighted the key modalities to strengthen Indonesia-Australia relations, namely the shared value of pluralistic democracy and the common and shared interest to enhance mutual understanding.
