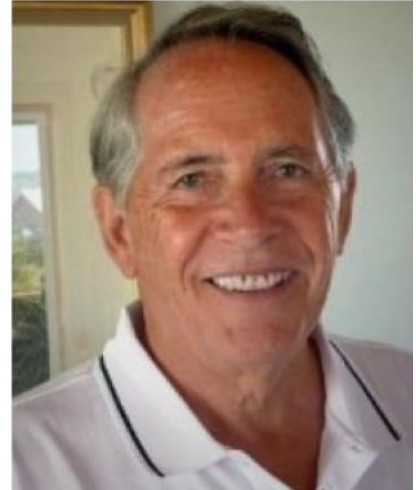
### The Beginning of the Beginning

## Webinars and podcasts – AIIA Victoria is going digital

While you can stay informed through the *Australian Journal of International Affairs* (members can access both the current issue and the archive when logged in) and the [Australian Outlook](#) weekly blog, we have been working hard to start delivering virtual events to keep you engaged until 'normal service' resumes.

Adding to the successful *Dyason House Podcast*, three interns are currently working on new **podcasts** covering conflicts, international health security, and women in international affairs. An audio-documentary on the Hong Kong protests is nearing completion, and we will shortly publish an interview with Emeritus Professor Gillian Triggs FAIIA, Assistant Secretary-General, Assistant High Commissioner for Protection, at the UNHCR on the impact of the coronavirus crisis on refugees. Our first **webinar** takes place on **Thursday 2 April**, with Associate Professor Matt McDonald of the University of Queensland discussing [Climate Change and National Security: International Responses](#).

## Dyason House events – our contribution to our members



2020 started well with several sold-out events during February and March. The first event for the year was ***In the Shadow of the Cold War: American Foreign Policy from George Bush Sr. to Donald Trump*** presented by Assoc. Prof. Timothy Lynch from the University of Melbourne. This talk coincided with the release of Lynch's new book *In the Shadow of the Cold War*. He discussed the ongoing power struggle between the United States and the rising global Chinese influence, identifying several elements

similar to the Cold War yet also acknowledging the difference between the US-USSR rivalry and the US-China rivalry today.

The second sold-out event for the year was hosted by Council Member Richard Iron CMG OBE in conversation with Michael Bachelard on ***Unrest in the Arab World***. Bachelard provided his insights in to the ever-changing Middle East following his recent return from Syria and Iraq and how the influential regional powers of Iran, Saudi Arabia and Turkey as well as global powers like the US and Russia are still heavily involved in geopolitical power plays and regional political exploitation.



We also hosted the ***Taiwan Study Tour Report Launch*** following a highly successful study tour to Taiwan in November 2019. The launch of the Report launch, which was also attended by the delegates who travelled to Taiwan and representatives of the Taipei Economic and Cultural Office (TECO) outlined the findings from several meetings with representatives from the Australian Office in Taipei; the Department of Economic Affairs; the Institute of National Policy Research; National Taiwan Normal University, and the Taiwan Foundation for Democracy.



Together with the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade Victoria State Office, we co-hosted Sarah Storey, Congressional Liaison Chief at the Australian Embassy in Washington DC, to discuss ***The Year Ahead in US Politics: Insights from Washington***.

**Note:** this was a unique members-only event with limited seating due to DFAT capacity. We acknowledge that some people were unable to attend due to the capacity restraints.

Following the passing of the Brexit Bill in Westminster on January 31, AIIA Fellow Colin Chapman FAIIA presented ***Breaking Up is Hard to Do***. He emphasised that although the UK has symbolically left the Europe Union, it is still currently very much tied to its economic and trade regulations which it will need to negotiate out of in the coming months.

While the Western Balkans aren't often associated with Australia in international affairs, we were pleased to host HE Ms Ruth Stewart, Australian Ambassador to Serbia, Montenegro and North Macedonia, who spoke about ***Australia and the Western Balkans in 2020***. The region shows immense international potential, especially with several countries seeking EU accession.



To celebrate International Women's Day we hosted a networking event on ***Women in International Affairs*** with the keynote speech delivered by Dr. Alexandra Phelan, a Postdoctoral Fellow at Monash University's [Gender, Peace and Security Centre](#). This unique event promoted the importance of gender equality in international affairs and also brought together a variety of people from

across Melbourne who are passionate about making the world a better and safer place for young girls and women.

## Study tours – developing our knowledge and sharing it

We had a terrific Study Tour Taiwan in October 2020. This followed our most successful Study Tour to Indonesia in June 2020.

We were fortunate to have in our delegation (pictured) a number of “old timer Taiwanese hands”. One of the more interesting conversations during the Study Tour was contrasting the Taiwan of yesterday with the terrific country it is today.



We were admirably looked after by the Australian Office in Taipei just as we were by the Taipei Economic and Cultural Office (TECO), their Ministries of Economic Affairs and of Foreign Affairs.

A few months ago, we started planning our **Silk Road Study Tour** for September/October 2020. That now looks most unlikely because Uzbekistan has recently closed its borders until the end of September 2020; it is likely to be postponed until April 2021.

We had planned meetings in Kazakhstan, Uzbekistan, Turkmenistan and Azerbaijan. These involved meetings with organisations such as Nazarbayev University, representatives from the OECD, UNHRC, European Bank for Reconstruction and Development as well as local and foreign journalists and diplomats. Other highlights were to include cultural activities such as visits to the Wedding Palace in Ashgabat, the Darvaza Gas Crater (aka the Gates of Hell), and the Caspian Sea and six UNESCO World Heritage Sites.
